# Property Association Tackles Renovations, Improves Communications

To keep you up to date on the latest chapter events, we now have two Web sites. Check out the active chapter's site at www.greeks.psu.edu/ifc/sn, and then visit the alumni chapter's site at sigmanu-psu.org. For your convenience, these sites are linked to each other.

In addition to the Web sites, two reports are available from me if you request a copy by phone or e-mail – the Homecoming 2003 Meeting Report and the Annual Report for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2003. Both of these reports are available electronically or in hard copy.

Many of you are interested in the progress we have made in renovating the House Mother's Suite. To date, we've installed a new roof and an iron safety railing. During the next phase of the renovation, we plan to have a professional design prepared and to replace the windows and exterior door. These activities will likely consume the remainder of the funds raised by Brother Leyburn. Therefore, final interior work will be delayed until additional funds are available.

The alumni chapter has provided funds for networking the PCs owned by the active brothers. The Property Association has funded several repairs, including the replacement of shower fixtures in both bathrooms, repairs to the dining room floor and the refurbishment of the dining room tables.

Last year, the Borough of State College passed an ordinance mandating that sprinkler systems be installed in all fraternity houses no later than Sept. 30, 2008. We estimate that such a system will cost us at least \$50,000. Although we have funds remaining from the mortgage we executed in 2002, these funds are insufficient to cover the full cost of the system. In addition, other significant capital improvements are needed. For example, additional funds are needed to complete the renovation of the House Mother's Suite, the dining room floor needs to be replaced and additional upgrades are needed in both bathrooms. Therefore, we plan to conduct a fund-raising campaign in the near future. We are currently meeting with several fund-raising organizations to develop a plan. Additional information will be provided in future newsletters.
